

Literacy and Communication and Language

This week we have looked at non-fiction mini-beast books, reading facts and descriptions of various bugs and creepy crawlies! We then played a guessing game 'What am I?' listening to clues and descriptions and then taking turns to guess the bug. We then chose a mini-beast to write a description or several clues for our class friends to then guess the minibeast. The children enjoyed reading their clues to their friends and choosing someone to guess the bug they were describing. It was a great activity for children to practise their reading skills and for them to read back their own work for sense and for them to self-edit if needed. We also read 'The Bad Tempered Ladybird, using the text for our English and Maths lessons. The children discussed the story, thinking about what bad tempered means and considered the actions of the angry ladybird. We talked about behaviour, how we talk to our friends and what makes us feel angry or bad tempered. Together we decided to make a friendship poster and write what makes a good friend and how we can be kind to those around us, at school and outside of school. Phonics lessons have continued into phase 4, practising reading and writing blends. Next week we will be reading 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar' and re-writing the story using our own mini-beast character.



Maths

In our Maths lessons, we used 'The Bad Tempered Ladybird' to help us tell the time. As we read the story, we made the different o'clock times on our class clocks and then went on to make half past and quarter past times. We talked about how we can say the times differently when we use minutes (eg. 5.15 or 6.45) The children were then asked about the times of the day and when we do different activities such as eat breakfast, have lunch, return home from school and bed time. The children could order different events using pictures of these different activities and were then encouraged to talk about these times and events in their day. Next week we will revisit days of the week and months of the year linking our learning to the book of the week 'The Very Hungry Caterpillar.

Suggestions of ways you can support your Reception child with the EYFS curriculum:

Talk about times of the day and refer to a clock or watch, allowing your child to read the o'clock times. Question the children as to what day is it today? What day is it tomorrow? Yesterday? Continue to practise reading and focus on comprehension. As the children become more skilled at reading, it is as equally important for them to understand and recall what they have read.

Our school trip is on Friday 17th May and we will weather watch very closely! We will decide early next week on suitable clothes but the children usually visit the nature reserve in their school tracksuits, trainers and waterproof school coat (We will send the PE bags/tracksuits home after Thursday's PE lesson) Previous years the sun has shone so fingers crossed and all will be well for an exciting bug hunt!

Throughout this week, we have completed the following writing activities based on the story 'Dear Greenpeace' by Simon James:


- Correcting the missing or misused punctuation in sentences.

- Giving a well-structured description of the poor working conditions Florence Nightingale experienced during the Crimean war.
- Finding information in a diary recount about the poor working conditions Florence Nightingale experienced.
- Contributing to a discussion, expressing their opinions about the poor working conditions Florence Nightingale experienced.
- Predicting what Florence Nightingale changed about the poor working conditions she experienced.
- Answering questions in response to direct questions about the poor working conditions Florence Nightingale experienced.

Suggestions of ways you can support your child's English:

In preparation for next week's learning, research information about the early life of Florence Nightingale.



Maths

This week, we have developed our knowledge and understanding of multiplication. We covered the following learning objectives this week:

- Grouping objects into 2, 5 or 10 to aid counting.
- Solving one-step problems involving multiplication by calculating the answer using concrete objects, pictorial representations and arrays with the support of the teacher.

Next week, we will be focusing on division. Over the course of the week, we will be covering the following skills:

- Adding three single digit numbers (mental maths).
- Solving one-step problems involving division by calculating the answer using concrete objects and pictorial representations with the support of the teacher.

Suggestions of ways you can support your child's Maths:

Practise solving division problems such as 'what is 6 shared between 2?' using the sharing method.

We will read and study 'I'll Take You To Mrs Cole'. We will look at reading skills such as: Considering different viewpoints Making predictions about the story

Suggestions of ways you can support your child's English:

Reading is a very important skill in year 2. Try to read a variety of text types – particularly non-fiction and poetry books. Ask them questions about their reading to check their understanding. Please ensure all children read regularly at home – thank you.

Maths
 This week, we looked at subtraction, both mental and written. We covered learning objectives such as: Can I use the column method to subtract? Can I subtract mentally? Can I reason about addition and subtraction? Next week, we will continue using the four operations, particularly multiplication. We will be able to: Recall X facts and their inverse Solve problems involving multiplication.

Suggestions of ways you can support your child's Maths:

Children should practise their times tables, 2, 5 and 10x particularly. They should also practise doubling and halving up to 20 and number bonds to 10 and 20.

Don't forget to practise real life maths with your child – weighing and measuring, position and direction and telling the time. It all helps!

Extra information: (This could include: trips, notices to parents, school initiatives, class events)

Please remember that the English homework is due in on Wednesday. The Maths homework should be completed on the Mathletics website.

Topic homework for this half term has now been given. The children can choose between growing a plant and recording its growth; writing a story or drawing a map. The project is due in on Wednesday 22nd May. I look forward to seeing their work.

Year 2 are still doing 'Forest School' on Thursday mornings. They need warm, waterproof and appropriate clothing as they will be outside all morning in all weathers!

The children will be swimming twice next week as they missed the session this week. They will be swimming on Tuesday morning as well as Friday afternoon.

- Can I compare and order numbers beyond 1000, using < and > and =?
- Can I confidently read and write numbers beyond 1000 in numerals and words?
- Can I read Roman numerals up to 20?

Next week we are learning:

- ■add and subtract numbers with up to three digits, using formal written methods of columnar addition and subtraction up to 999
- ■count forwards or backwards in steps of powers of 10 for any given number up to 10 000 (NC Yr4/11+)
- ■confidently count on in multiples of 2, 3, 4, 5, 8, 10 50 and 100 (from any given starting number) (NC Yr4/11+)

Maths

This week, we have been covering the following objectives:

- Can I multiply and divide whole numbers and those involving decimals (up to 3dp) by 10, 100 and 1000?
- Can I find term to term rules in words?
- Can I complete calculations using my knowledge of BIDMAS?

Next week we will be looking at:

- Can I know and use the vocabulary of prime numbers, prime factors and composite numbers?
- Can I recognise and use square numbers and cube numbers, and the notation for squared and cubed?
